Carey Friends and Supporters,

As we conclude our fall trimester and move forward into the winter term, we are thankful to God for keeping us safe and providing an atmosphere which has allowed our students to progress toward their goals. We ended the fall trimester with a 3.4 percent increase in enrollment. Most schools in our area were pleased to have a level enrollment or minor increase. When you receive this magazine, we will be in our winter trimester, and we expect to have an increase over winter 2019 of nearly 5 percent. The Lord continues to bless us.

Our primary goal is to keep our students and employees safe as we move forward. Elsewhere in this magazine, you will find a report of our current status. With the safety of our students in mind, we have decided that all classes between the Thanksgiving Holiday and January 11, 2021, will be online (professional programs will follow their schedules). We have reduced housing fees considerably for the winter term. If for some unexpected reason, a student needs to stay in the dorms and have meals in the cafeteria during this period (international students, athletes, etc.), we will add back the discounted portion on a case-by-case basis. The purpose of this long break is to eliminate excessive movement between dorm and home, which increases the possibility of spreading the virus to the campus and to the student's home community. I hope and pray that this will help to prevent spreading infections.

Considering that many families have already made travel plans for Spring Break, we have decided to allow Spring Break as scheduled, but we are trusting our students to maintain CDC recommendations during this time and especially as they return to campus.

I continue to remind you of our need for financial support during this critical time. We have experienced unexpected expenses to fight the COVID-19 virus— masks, disinfectants, cleaning materials, plates/utensils, etc. If you are able to help us to defray these costs, we would be so thankful. If you have unused gift cards that you could donate to support students who are stranded and unable to travel home, you may mail them to Valerie Bridgforth, Office of Student Support, WCU Box 195, 710 William Carey Parkway, Hattiesburg, MS 39401.

We ask for your continued prayers as we deal with the unprecedented months ahead.





College of Health Sciences

A 74,000-SQUARE-FOOT BUILDING IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION AT THE CORNER OF TUSCAN AVENUE AND CHERRY STREET. WHEN COMPLETED IN 2021, IT WILL BE THE NEW HOME OF THE COLLEGE OF HEALTH SCIENCES – AND THE LARGEST STRUCTURE WCU HAS EVER BUILT.


WHY SUCH A BIG BUILDING?

Enrollment at the College of Health Sciences has doubled over the last five years. Expanding on its historical foundation, the Joseph and Nancy Fail School of Nursing, the COHS added new programs for students – pharmacy, physical therapy, health information management, and health administration and education. Health care programs are available at WCU's Hattiesburg, Biloxi and Baton Rouge campuses.

- The College of Health Sciences announced a record-breaking enrollment for the fall 2020 term. More than 1,000 students enrolled in fall classes.
- In September 2019, the WCU College of Osteopathic Medicine was authorized by the Commission on Osteopathic College

- Accreditation to expand the size of its incoming class by 100 percent over a three-year period.
- For a decade, the medical school has admitted 100 new students each year. This fall, it welcomed more than 150 first-year students. In 2021, the incoming class will be 175 students. The year after that, it will be 200 students. The ultimate effect will be to double the size of the medical school from 400 students to 800 students.
- The new building will house the School of Nursing and all other Hattiesburg campus health programs except for the medical school, which will expand into the buildings vacated by the College of Health Sciences – Fail-Asbury Hall, Mary Ross Hall and Thomas Hall.

COLLEGE OF HEALTH SCIENCES

The College of Health Sciences at Carey announced a record-breaking enrollment for the fall 2020 term.

Overall, enrollment has doubled over the last five years.

"We are thrilled in this time of crisis for our country that we are able to allow students to move forward with their educational needs," said Dr. Janet Williams, associate vice president for health programs.

Due to the growth of the College of Health Sciences, and a

simultaneous enrollment expansion authorized for the WCU College of Osteopathic Medicine, a 74,000-square-foot College of Health Sciences Building is under construction at the Hattiesburg campus.

When completed in 2021, it will house the School of Nursing and all other Hattiesburg campus health programs except for the medical school, which will expand into the buildings vacated by the College of Health Sciences – Fail-Asbury Hall, Mary Ross Hall and Thomas Hall.

WINTERS SCHOOL OF MUSIC

The School of Music posted a recordbreaking enrollment for the fall term and is finding alternate ways to maintain its performance schedule.

"William Carey has the highest enrollment of music students in school history and one of

the largest schools of music in the state. This record enrollment is a testimony to the work of our dean, Dr. Wes Dykes, his faculty and staff," said WCU President Dr. Tommy King.

During the pandemic, Winters School has pivoted to virtual performance to allow students and audiences to share music and worship. With musicians and singers observing COVID-19 safety protocols, concerts are livestreamed or recorded at Thomas Fine Arts Auditorium. Online concerts in October featured performances by WCU's Symphonic Winds, Carey Jazz Lab, String Orchestra, Chorale and Worship Choir.

"A state-of-the-sound lab, Tuscan Studios, is also in development. The need for instruction in the latest methods of technology has never been more important. This studio will be used to train students to thrive as leaders in church, school, and music industry technology settings," Dykes said.

"We are motivated to see students choose William Carey because we know they will not only get a great education – they will have the

opportunity to grow in character. Our deepest desire is to see them be the best at what they do when they graduate and make a difference in the world."

SCHOOL OF EDUCATION


The School of Education has posted a record fall enrollment as well as an all-time record enrollment. When WCU started classes on Aug. 24, the School of Education had an enrollment of 1,705 students. This represents an increase of 35 percent over last fall. The undergraduate program increased by more than 50 percent with an enrollment of 532 students. Other than undergraduate, records were also posted in Educational Leadership and the Alternate Route program.

"This growth comes as the result of hard work and dedication of the faculty and staff, but it is also a sign that many more people in Mississippi are considering education as a profession," said Dr. Ben Burnett, WCU executive vice president and dean of the School of Education.

"Our mission is to help solve the teacher shortage in our state, and this record enrollment is encouraging because it shows we are making progress. We are thankful for wonderful students who are helping to make this possible."

According to statistics from the U.S. Department of Education, WCU's School of Education is the largest in the state – graduating an average of more than 500 graduate and undergraduate students in each of the last three years.





REV. SLATER MURPHY

Rev. Slater Murphy received an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Carey June 24 during a private ceremony at Bass Chapel.

"Dr. Murphy has been a major influence in church music in Mississippi for decades. His witness for Christ and his unique talent for challenging church members to develop their full potential are characteristics that make William Carey proud of our graduate," said WCU President Dr. Tommy King.

Murphy earned a bachelor's degree in music from Carey 1979 – but his decision to attend college in Hattiesburg was almost accidental.

"There was no church music degree available at Tulane University in my neighborhood. So, where was I going to go? I just kind of wandered into the music office at William Carey, on a Saturday, and there was Dr. Winters," Murphy said.

"He invited me into his office and said, 'Well, let's do an audition, let me hear you do something.' So I did something very simple and, on that day, he offered me a music scholarship, which was undeserved. My professors and friends loved me and showed me mercy. Show mercy in your prayer life. Ask God to give William Carey guidance. It is in times of testing like these that God refines our character."

After graduating from WCU, Murphy attended Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and earned a master's degree in church music. He was associate pastor in music at Fairview Baptist Church in Columbus for

26 years. Since 2011, Murphy has served as director of the Church Music Department at the Mississippi Baptist Convention Board.

Murphy thanked his family: "My wife, Marsha, deserves at least half of this degree. She has earned it alongside me. She is the epitome of a worship pastor's wife in the way she conducts her life."

During the ceremony, two WCU officials placed the doctoral hood over Murphy's head. One was Dr. Garry Breland, WCU provost and vice president for academic affairs. The other was his son, Dr. Brian Murphy, an assistant professor of music at WCU's Donald and Frances Winters School of Music. Father and son perform dual organ/piano recitals as the "Murphy Mixture."

SEN. ROGER WICKER

The university conferred the Doctor of Public Service, honoris causa, upon U.S. Senator Roger Wicker Aug. 27 during a ceremony on the Hattiesburg campus.

"Roger Wicker has given his whole life to serving others. From his years in the military, to his service as a U.S. Representative and now U.S. Senator, his service has been impeccable. WCU is honored to recognize Senator Wicker with this degree," said Dr. Tommy King.

Wicker began his career in public service in the Mississippi Senate representing Lee and Pontotoc counties. He served in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1995 to 2007. Since 2007, Wicker has represented Mississippi in the U.S. Senate. He has also served on active duty

in the U.S. Air Force, retiring from the reserve in 2004 with the rank of lieutenant colonel.

"I'm so humbled, absolutely down to my very core, and this will always be one of the highest honors I could possibly receive."



"We are thrilled that our Baton Rouge campus has received full approval, and we are excited to implement our LPN Advanced Placement program beginning in spring 2021," said Dr. Alicia Lundstrom, dean of the WCU School of Nursing.

"It is the ministry of William Carey University School of Nursing to improve health outcomes in Mississippi and Louisiana by graduating students prepared both academically and spiritually. We look forward to the growth we know is coming on our Baton Rouge campus."

WCU at Baton Rouge General accepted its first bachelor's degree nursing students in fall 2018.

In addition to meeting academic standards, nursing schools must graduate a class of students before they are eligible for full approval. WCU at Baton Rouge's inaugural class graduated in February 2020. The second class graduated in August 2020.

"We're very proud of our graduates. As a group, the inaugural class achieved a 100 percent pass rate on the national board



exam on their first attempt. The second class is currently awaiting approvals to test for the national boards. The dedication of our

Rouge to initiate an

accelerated advanced placement program for licensed practical nurses. Already available at WCU's Hattiesburg and Tradition campuses, the program provides a flexible route for LPNs to earn bachelor's degrees in nursing:

- Students can attend classes full-time or part-time.
- Students attending full-time can complete their degrees in 18 months. Students who exercise part-time options have 30 months to complete the program.
- No entrance exam is required, and students can test out of some courses.

Ben Austin State Teacher of the Year

BEN WAS NAMED THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION'S TEACHER OF THE YEAR FOR THE 2019-2020 SCHOOL YEAR. HE TEACHES HISTORY AT PETAL HIGH SCHOOL AND IS ONE OF THE YOUNGEST TEACHERS EVER TO RECEIVE THIS HONOR.

"I still can't believe it. It hasn't worn off yet," Ben said. "I feel blessed and honored. I'm a fourth-year teacher, and I was very surprised by it."

He became a teacher despite thinking as a child that he would follow in his father's footsteps in chemical engineering. When he was 12, Austin's parents became missionaries in Lima, Peru, and moved there from Baton Rouge. Austin attended the International Christian School of Lima where his history teacher, Casey Herring, named him the student Most Likely to Become a History Teacher.

That experience started him on a journey to become a teacher. When he graduated in 2011, Austin enrolled at Carey, where his sister was also studying, and earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in secondary education. He was very active on campus, including serving as BSU president his senior year. After working as a recruiter for William Carey, he took on a job at Petal High School and has taught there ever since. He met his wife, Erin, at Carey. She has two Carey degrees in counseling psychology.

The Mississippi Department of Education's Teacher of the Year program honors one teacher from a pool of candidates, one nominated by each district statewide, for the award. The teacher chosen then represents the state in the National Teacher of the Year competition. Along with the award, the winner receives a \$5,000 stipend, a classroom technology package and year-long travel expenses relating to Mississippi Teacher of the Year activities.

In addition to earning the School Administrator of the Year award, she is also Mississippi's National Distinguished Principal, an honor for educators across the country.


"My most rewarding professional experience as an administrator is watching the growth of my students and teachers," Debra said.
