DEter said unto Jesus, Lord, I how oft shall my brother fin against me, and I forgive him? till seven times? Jesus faith unto him, I fay not unto thee, Until seven times: but, Until seventy times seven. Therefore is the kingdom of

heaven likened unto a certain king, who would take account of his fervants. And when he had begun to reckon, one was brought unto him, who owed him ten thousand talents. But forafmuch as he had not to pay, his lord commanded him to be fold, and his wife and children, and all that he had, and payment to be made. The fervant
