A FORM of PRAYER with FASTING, to be used yearly upon the Thirtieth of January, being the day of the Martyrdom of the bleffed King Charles I. To implose the mercy of God, that neither the guilt of that facred

and innocent blood, nor those other fins, by which God was provoked to deliver up both us and our King into the hands of cruel and unreasonable men, may at any

time hereafter be visited upon us, or our posterity. If this day shall happen to be Sunday, this form of prayer shall be used and the Fast kept, the next day following. And upon the

Lord's day next before the day to be kept, at Morning Prayer, immediately after the Nicene Creed, notice, shall be given for the due observation of the said day.

¶ The Service of the day shall be the same with the usual Office for Holy days in all things, except where it is in this Office otherwife appointed.

The Order for MORNING PRAYER.

¶ He that ministereth, shall begin with one or more of these Sentences. TTO the Lord our God be-
