Also on the horizon is The National Diabetes and Obesity Research Center at Tradition. This is a joint venture between WCU, MGCCC, the renowned Cleveland Clinic's

federal government agencies. The
Center's mission is to create the
best diabetes and obesity
research center in the United
States to not only cure one of
Mississippi's most prevalent health
issues, but to solve the problem
on national and international
levels. There are even plans for a
Coast Family Health Center and a
Dynamic Dyslexia Design/The 3-D

School & Evaluation Center. The Learning Medical City is hoping to bring additional research facilities, retail partners, student housing, assisted living, and other medical facilities to Tradition. This area will definitely be putting the Mississippi Gulf Coast on the map as a major Health Care player. Keep an eye out for all the new developments.


- Preceptor Program information binder will be provided to each practice site and will include a Preceptor's manual, Office of Experiential Education contact information, newsletter, etc.
- Preceptor newsletter- "The Carey Chronicle" is a quarterly electronic newsletter created as an additional means of communication between the School of Pharmacy and our professional experience preceptors. It shares important information about the School of Pharmacy, pharmacy news, events, and preceptor development opportunities.
- Pharmacist's Letter- Pharmacist's Letter is an online resource that offers our preceptors continuing education (home-study courses and live webinars), sample activities and assignments for students on rotation, as well as practice-based teaching tools and a preceptor discussion board.
